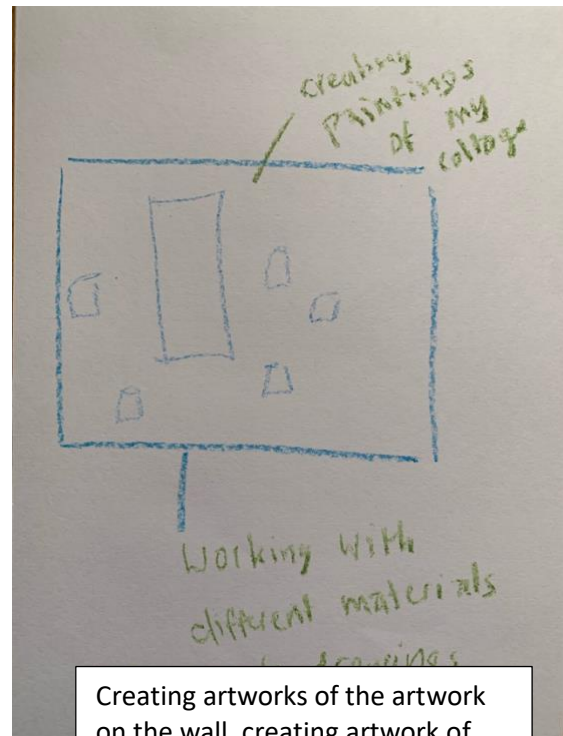
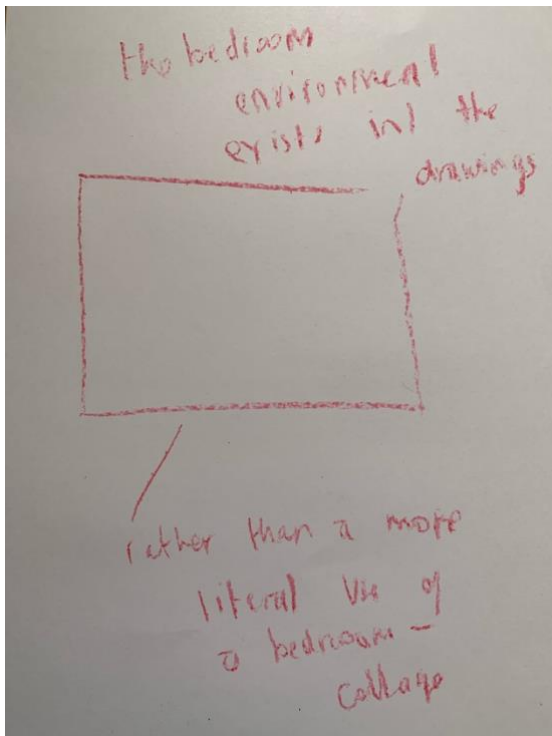
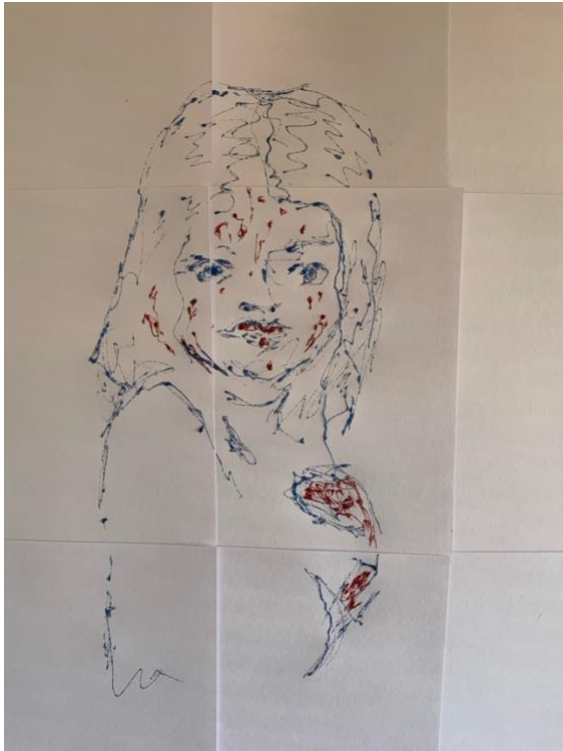
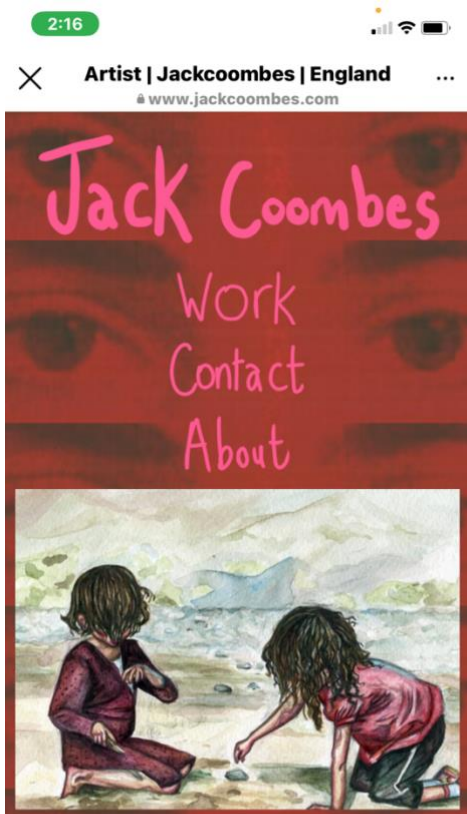


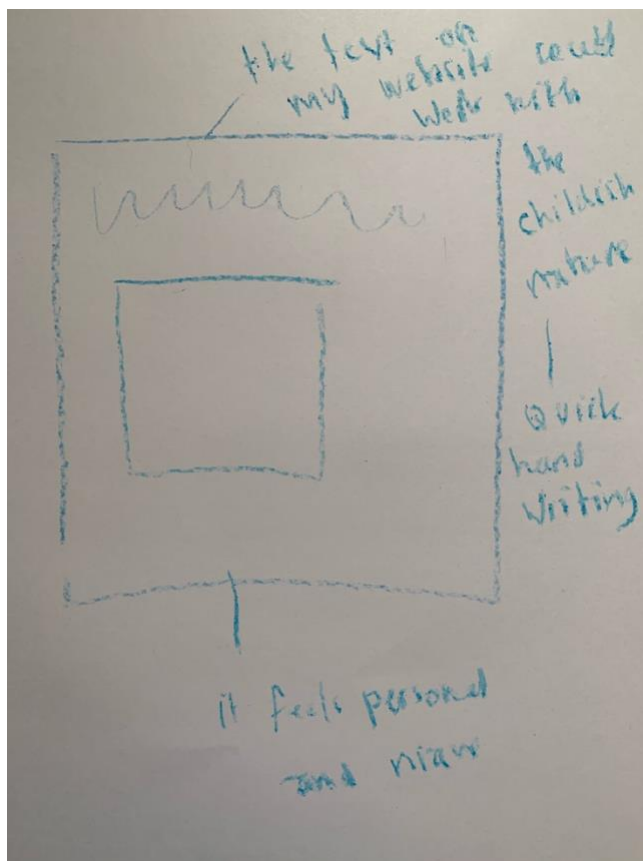
Resolving work



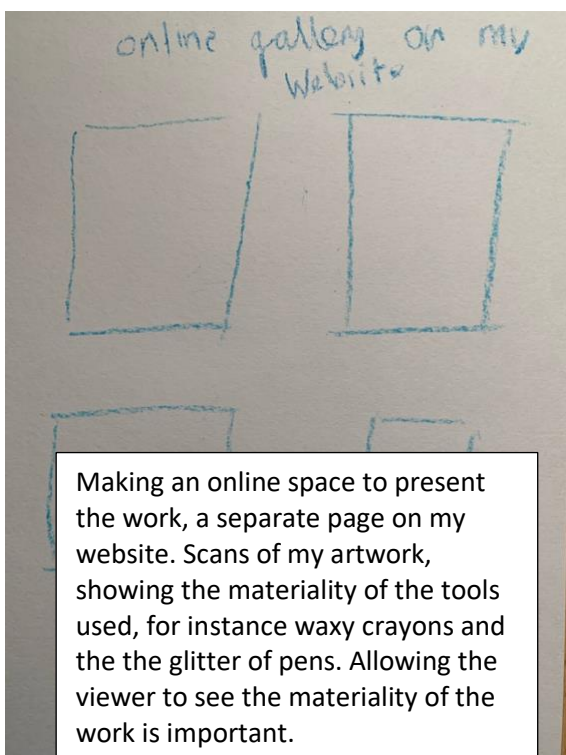
Creating artworks of the artwork on the wall, creating artwork of the collage that has taken place in bedroom environment.



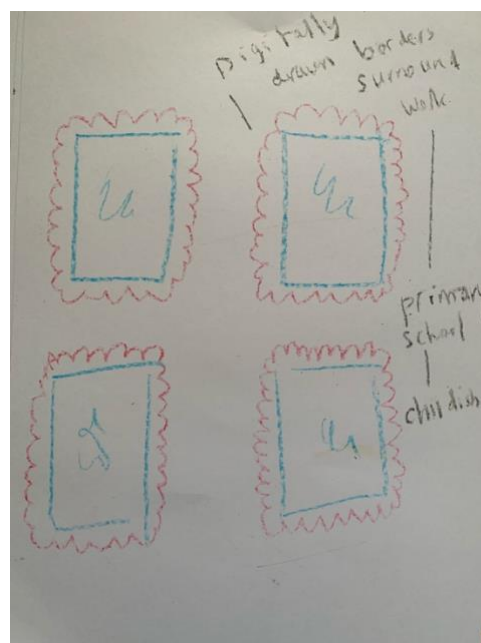
Using the playful text that exists on my website to reinforce the playfulness of my work, I think having my work exist on my website will be interesting in this way.



Introducing the digitally playful elements that I enjoy on my website, creating digital borders around my online gallery of work. This was an idea I took from a one to one, where we discussed the effectiveness off the handwritten text which accompanies the work.



Making an online space to present the work, a separate page on my website. Scans of my artwork, showing the materiality of the tools used, for instance waxy crayons and the the glitter of pens. Allowing the viewer to see the materiality of the work is important.

I am starting to think about how my work can be subtle whilst being playful in how it overlaps what is on my wall. I want to collect some more childhood imagery to create more chaos and noise on the wall. I am also thinking about rearranging the way things are positioned on the wall to allow more space for some larger pieces I want to create.
