
Level 6 Degree Show Catalogues

Design for Performance Level 6 Major Project

Design for Performance third year students have produced some some excellent graduating projects, produced in the face of the restrictions from Covid. One of these was a collaborative Major Project submission by two Level 6 students Jasmine Fassenfelt and Rebecca Knight working on a realised sculptural installation. *Natures Hand - The Lost Gardens of Heligan, Cornwall.* This piece was inspired by the great work (pictured right) that Heligan does, in maintaining natural spaces, and fostering a connection with nature in times when it is so important to stay grounded. It is also partly inspired by the local artwork already found along the woodland walk, which emphasise the beauty of the land.



Level 6 BA Fine Art and BA Art and Design Curators Review

In acknowledging the culmination and resolution of works for level 6, we held two curator review events streamed live on Teams. The first event saw an inconversation review of the works with Kim McAleese from Grand Union and Tom Ellmer from Ikon Gallery and the second event with Deborah Robinson from New Art Gallery Walsall and artist/ curator Antonio Roberts. Level 5 BA Art and Design Establishing Art and Design Practice 2

This term we all learnt a new skill and put it to good use. This might be: learning how to code games to challenge the systemic biases that create imposter syndrome; learning to digitally paint in order to journal and improve mental health in isolation; animating to unlock childhood wonder; reconnecting with nature through wood carving, and many more. These new uses were made into 'how to' guides for people to make along with, that also covered why they should care about it too. Level 5 Live Projects BA Fine Art and Art and Design

The Level 5 Live Projects represent an exciting breadth of approaches to making work in a live way within the parameters of the current context. The Art and Education Outside students took advantage of working with MA Art and Education Students to develop projects for young people to participate in. The Artist Walk live project students explored walking as an art method looking at strategies from Situationism to Protest where students used everyday walks in their neighbourhood and documented them in sculpture, video, stories, posters and collage. Students working on the BAAAD Pictures live project explored personal situations and ideas through the lens of the camera. The BAAAD Press live project allowed students to develop their own publications considering communication and distribution of ideas. On the Water students explored the potentials of making and designing in response to the ecosystems that surround us.









BA Fine Art visit to The New Gallery Walsall: Ani Smith Exhibition

A small group of us were lucky enough to have been given a talk and tour by Deborah Robinson the Curator and Head of Exhibitions on Anj Smith's exhibition. It was just the tonic to see and discuss the exquisitely crafted paintings. The intricate detail in the work contained layers of narrative and conversations upon environmentalism, feminism, the treatment of gender and exploration of mental health. It's a rare opportunity to see so many of her works together, please go see!

MA Contemporary Art China Museum in a Pandemic

MA Contemporary Arts China students have completed the Live Project 'The Museum in a Pandemic'. This Live Project explored museum and art gallery responses to the global pandemic, including Ikon Gallery, Vivid Projects and Recent Activity in Birmingham, Firstsite Gallery in Colchester and the Victoria and Albert Museum in London. MA Art and Design: Interdisciplinary Practices

Students from the MA Art and Design worked with poet, film maker, photographer and former young people's laureate for London, <u>Caleb Femi</u>. Working alongside Professor Onkar Kular and his MA Design students from HDK-Valand-Academy of Art and Design, University of Gothenburg, this one day workshop ran a format called the misreading group. We took texts that exist outside of the frame of design - by non-designers and usually marginalised authors and read them together as design text collectively. As part of the misreading, students annotated the text to make them into design texts.





Level 4 BA Fine Art and BA Art and Design

Level 4 Design for Performance: Insect Installation

During a time when collaborative projects appeared impossible, L4 students worked independently towards an end goal of an installation. Students individually selected and studied an insect to replicate three times, increasing in scale, out of brown paper and corrugated card. Each student had the opportunity to photograph their insects in whatever style they wanted, and then to contribute to a collaborative installation. The impact of lockdown on creative environments has meant the inevitable vacancy of studio spaces. The final exhibition presents an artist's studio deserted mid-work, the artist assumed they'd be returning the following day. Due to their absence from their typical creative space, they are left to fantasize about their unfinished work, away from the restraints of reality.







Level 4 BA Fine Art and BA Art and Design Collaborative Project

We have seen the successful conclusion of the level 4 cross-course collaboration module. There were many exciting themes and approaches, including the group 'Atlas' presenting an proposed exhibition and a radio station in an off-shore fort, 'Spirit' colliding technology with ancient religions, and F.E.M creating an outdoor sanctuary art space for women. It is a challenging module that establishes principles of effective group working. This year it was especially so as it was entirely online, requiring even more skills in organisation and communication. The groups however pulled it off. Well done to them all.

Foundation

The Foundation Course has ended 2021 with students producing a tremendous range of work.

Covid-19, along with the subsequent lockdowns, undoubtedly brought many challenges for us but the strength of creative practice has to be recognised through the commitment of our students and their perseverance, focus and drive.



Material Encounters Research Cluster Events


