Whats been happening at the School of Art:



Night School Level 4 Fine Art + Art and Design Work in Progress - B21 / Foyer

Level 4 BA Fine Art and BA Art & Design students last week took part in their first Night School. They presented outcomes from Semester 1 via a show reel in the Foyer of Margaret Street alognside showing work in progress in their studio (B21). It was great to see so many of the group discussing their work with students across the School during the evening.









Night School Level 6 Fine Art Work in Progress Exhibition - F02

Third Year BA Fine Art students transformed their studio space to present a pop-up work in progress exhibition for Night School. They utilised the opportunity to experiment with display, curatorial strategies and to develop prototype outcomes in testing their degree show ideas.





45 Caprices Level 5 Fine Art Exhibition Stryx Gallery

A caprice -Playful, free in form and of a lively character. Fast, intense, impulsive and virtuosic.



This exhibition which took place last week, brought together the work of our 45 second year BA Fine Art students. The exhibition allowed the students to extend their practices through experimentation with materials, media and forms of display in exploring ways of communicating ideas. The title of this exhibition reflecting the groups dynamic approaches to making. Well done everyone!





L5 Art and Design Exploring Site



Artist Caitlyn Kiely ran a workshop for L5 Art & Design students to think about different ways to approach 'site' – both on location and in the studio. There were five workstations that proposed different ways of working: an image library, narrating landscapes, activating found objects and zooming in and out.



Level 5 Art and Design also explored site through a tour of the Jewellery Quarter Cemeteries Project from Josie Wal showing us the catacombs at Warstone Lane Cemetery.



Level 5 Live Projects

This Semester, a nubmber of second year students from BA Fine Art and BA Art and Design are taking part in the School of Art Live Projects. This module involves students working with and responding to an external context. The three live projectes running this year are: Art and Markets with Eastside Projects (pictured below), World Building with Wheatley Fellow Joey Holder and Art/Education/ Outside with Summerfield Community Stables.



This week students from the World Building Live Project visited Nottingham Contemporary to see the exhibition 'Our Silver City' (image below). The group show travels to the end of this century, featuring works from the last 400 million years. Similar to a sci-fi-novel it imagines possible future worlds through story-telling and speculative fictions. In the coming weeks the students will be developing their own 'world-building' projects, and reconsidering their artworks not strictly as individual objects but as expansive, constructed worlds.



Students from the Art/Education/Outside this week had great fun (braving the wind) in testing the workshops they had been developing on young participants at Summerfiled Community Stables during half term (images below).



Foundation Progression Workshops







Semester 2 comes with an action-packed timetable for Foundation Students including 'Headline Acts' from visiting BCU BA Courses. BA Fine Art (pictured above) and BA Art and Design (with Creative Technologies) (pictured below) have led the way with two inspiring presentations and workshops. These sessions are designed to underpin what students already know about their potential BA Courses, and to 'dangle the carrot' for what the future may hold. The Foundation team look forwards to meeting Graphics, Photography, Illustration, Video Games Digital Arts and Design for Performance in the very near future.


Sandwell College Visit

PhD News

Two of our current postgraduate researchers have current shows in the region. Yazmin Boyle, presents a solo exhibition, Translating the Materials Wants and Needs at Asylum Gallery in Wolverhampton from 19th February to 12th March. A central part of Boyle's practice is collaboration, through which they investigate materials, processes, and the viewers' reactions to them. The exhibition will feature Boyle's artworks, as well as works created in collaboration with participants, exploring how encounters can deepen our understanding of ourselves, our bodies, and our collective action.



Roo Dhissou's collaborative residency with Sahjan Kooner for ArtCore Derby has recently manifested as the show (ASTRAL VILLAGE) slooooowwww at Riverlights in Derby from 18th February to 12th March. The artists have created a dreamlike exhibition that weaves narratives through the lens of North India. The work travels from a cyborg in Punjab through to a black hole at the centre of the galaxy. Recurrent ideas of the celestial, community and migratory are transformed through craft based practices and digital environments.



MA Art and Education Practices School of the Underkraft



MA Arts and Education Practices students spent a Tuesday afternoon in February swapping their usual G20 home for studying in Mark Essen's School of the Underkraft (BAS9) to plan how they could work together during Semester 2. As art school within an art school Mark's project is informed by a series of collaborations: A-Level students from Thomas Telford University Technical College work with Mark and Sahjan Kooner to make furniture, staff from the university loaned their office plants, and staff & alumni from the MA Arts and Education Practices course: Larissa Shaw, Joanna Fursman & Thomas Eke were commissioned by Arts Connect to make activity briefs for young people using the project.

MA Contemporary Art China British Art Show 9 - Wolverhampton




ITS BAAAD THAT Level 6 Art and Design Work in Progress Exhibition


School of Art UG Developments - Update from Steve Bulcock

To start with a very brief history - Since the BA Art & Design course relocated from Bournville to join the longstanding BA Fine Art course at Margaret Street (Sept 2013), it has become increasingly clear to staff and students (and many others judging by questions we're often asked) that these two independently conceived courses share a great many features. Both have overlapping elements of good practice that would recommend either as potential routes of study for those interested in contemporary art practice.

Over the past few years, staff have been working with key stakeholders (current students, alumni, prospective students, teachers, industry partners, employers) to expand our teaching provision and to further differentiate our courses. The result of these discussions, a suite of new undergraduate courses that launch in September 2022, courses that develop our already very successful practices, and align with an ever changing landscape while also taking advantage of staff expertise, research interests and pedagogic methodologies from the recently formed Birmingham Institute of Creative Arts. As a result, the three distinct courses outlined here will give students an even broader range of options and more flexibility when choosing their undergraduate degree route and throughout their journey with the Birmingham School of Art.


BA Art Business (Level 6 Top-Up)

Our new, employability-focused BA (Hons) Art Business course (offered full and part-time) has been written for those who might be interested in the inner workings of the creative industries, how they are structured and operate, and to find out about the breadth of career opportunities available. It is an alternative option for the final stage of a degree (level 6) and is a mixture of theory and practical study with live briefs from the sector and provides the opportunity to build a bespoke network.



BA Fine Art

The BA Fine Art course draws from the strengths of the current BA Fine Art and BA Art and Design courses (and their interesting points of intersection) in frameing students learning through four key principles. These form pillars of skill development, knowledge and understanding (see below) which are developed within the studios, the workshops and by working across the City as sites of practice.



BA Art and Design (with Creative Technologies)

Our new hybrid Art and Design BA, with its pathway in Creative Technologies, is an innovative course for the future exploring the intersection of Art and Design methodologies. This is an interdisciplinary course in which students will move fluidly between the fields of art, design and technology.



Next up – development in the MA programmes – watch this space.
