This kind of consciousness of past events shapes Indian mythology, in genealogies and historical narratives and it's unlike the histories we learn at school. This different interpretation of history is something that is subtly ingrained within Indian culture, ithihas is a consciousness and acknowledgement of the past and shapes a culture and way of life.




A visual and poetic investigation into understanding my identity as part of the South Asian Indian Diaspora.




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The Archived Photo Album

Still images from 'The Archived Photo Album' film, 3: 18 min, 2022



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


